
Speeding

On the 20th we met with a Superintendent from the Cambridgeshire Police to discuss how they can work with the Parish Council (PC) to address the speeding issues we are seeing in the village.

As a result of this meeting, we are looking to re-establish the Community Speed Watch program, however, the Police do not currently have a Community Speed Watch coordinator so once this role is filled, we can look at getting this up and running.

As some of you may know Horningsea was the first village in Cambridgeshire to install an Auto Speedwatch camera and since then there has been a growing number of villages fitting these cameras. We have had varying amounts of success with the Police as to how they use the data collected. Cambridgeshire Police have confirmed that they are looking to adopt the Auto Speedwatch system on a wider basis. Before they are able to do this they will have to go through extensive consultation.

The data from our village camera shows for the period between the 28th of April to the 28th of July 2024, 4,155 verified speeding incidents, with the maximum speed recorded at 68mph. We are only logging vehicles travelling over 37mph. This is a static camera and only records a single direction of traffic.

The data from the Auto Speedwatch system has highlighted that vehicles from a local company have been regularly speeding through the village. Consequently, we have made contact with them to highlight this to them. As a result of speaking to this company we have seen a positive result in stopping these vehicles from speeding.

In addition, we are working with Cllr Graham Cone who in turn is working with the Taxi Licensing Manager to write to licensed taxi drivers and warn them they have been caught on our Auto Speedwatch camera. They will be told that the speeding report will be kept on file, and further reports may lead to formal action being taken against them.

Laney Meadow

As discussed at the last Parish Council meeting Quy Estates/ Dakin Estates have put forward the idea of a development on Laney Meadow. They have asked the Parish Council to respond accordingly with our views. As such we have set up a brief survey to gauge the feelings of the Village.

Anglia Water - sewage leaks on St John's Lane

Given the ongoing sewage discharges that occur at the bottom of St John's Lane, the PC held an onsite meeting with Anglia Water. From this meeting, we understand that the cause of the blockages which manifest as a discharge from the drainage cover at the bottom of St John's Lane is due to poorly designed pipework at the pump station on Dock Lane.

We are pushing Anglia Water to now address this and undertake the required upgrade work on the pump station to stop this happening in the future.

The current update received from the Chief Executive of Anglian Water is as below. The PC have and are continuing to chase Anglian Water to ensure this is dealt with as soon as possible.

"The works have not yet been prioritised for delivery. The issue was reviewed against other submissions, which are looked at on a case-by-case basis, taking into account risk and severity.

As a result, we have arranged for this to now be escalated through a different work stream and again, this will go to a review meeting within the next two weeks and I will send you an update as soon as we are able to following that meeting.

With regards to cleaning the line, we do have a Planned Preventative Maintenance (PPM) in place which is a 2-year wet well plan. This was last completed on 28 January 2023 and is next due in January 2025.

I can also confirm that our Operational Risk Reduction Manager has looked at the three closest sensors to the pumping station and has confirmed that all of these sites have a Pollution Driver which means any alert that needs to be raised, will be sent on a 4 hours Level Of Service basis to the field technicians to attend."

Baits Bite Lock

At the PC meeting held on the 24th of July, the Chair of the Conservators of the River Cam was asked for an update as to the current closure of Baits Bite lock, we were directed to the current update as on their website. The first paragraph is below:

"Over recent weeks, since we first closed the locks, the Conservators have sought further expert reviews regarding the threats to the historic lock island structures, the impact of opening the locks on the structures and the nature of the work required to stabilise them. Based on this expert advice and in view of the increasing movement at the lock islands, particularly at Baits Bite, Conservators consider that in the interests of public safety we cannot justify opening the locks or lock islands until the lock islands have been stabilised. We recognise that this will cause great concern and inconvenience for powered boat users. The lock islands are being monitored regularly in the meantime. In the coming weeks additional information about the repairs will be clarified and this will be communicated as soon as possible."

Greater Cambridgeshire partnership – cycleway and associated road calming measures

Below is the current update we have from the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) response to an email sent to them by the PC. Should we receive any further information we will update accordingly.

"Thank you for writing to me, I would like to assure you that we are very keen to complete the project as quickly as we can, and we do understand your frustrations.

In line with the postponement of works, the event with the school you mentioned has been deferred too.

The combination of a wider path and slower speed limits on Horningsea Road will improve safety along the road. But I recognise the 20mph limits in the villages will be more important to parishioners.

We aim to be back on site as soon as the other maintenance works are completed and will finish the remaining works in Horningsea Village (installing traffic islands, buildout, street lighting, 20mph signage) and Fen Ditton (installing belisha beacons) in one go, once we have a road space permit to do so.

Our board agreed an 'early works' programme in September 2022, which aimed to accelerate delivery of some sections of the 12 greenways. The Horningsea Road path being one of those schemes. This means that works are delivered as the opportunity arises around other planned works in the area, using the same contractors, rather than booking the entire project in in one go, which can take a lot longer. As such we've been able to work on detailed designs for the latter sections while construction was underway on the path, rather than wait for the whole scheme's design to be completed.

While this means we have been able to complete the path well ahead of any other greenway in the region, the remaining elements are now in the queue behind other essential maintenance works in the local area, so as not to disrupt the road network too significantly or overstretch our contractors. We will of course inform you and council members as soon as we have a date confirmed for the remaining works.

I hope this answers your questions and offers some reassurance."

New Executive Headteacher appointment

Anglian Learning Trust appointed Mrs Emily Thompson to the role of Executive Headteacher of Fen Ditton Community Primary School and Marleigh Primary Academy. Mrs Thompson will be in place with effect from 4 November 2024. Mrs Thompson has extensive primary leadership experience including previously leading across two schools as an executive headteacher for a trust based in Buckinghamshire.

Supporting Miss Thompson will be Miss Charlotte James, Mrs Cara Hearns and Mrs Alice Parker to the positions of Executive Deputy Headteachers working across both Fen Ditton Community Primary School and Marleigh Primary Academy. As part of their role, Miss James will be responsible for SEND and Mrs Hearns and Mrs Parker, who will be sharing the full-time position, will be responsible for the curriculum.

Parking outside Fen Ditton Primary school

It is now getting very dangerous to park outside Fen Ditton Primary school - traffic is increasing and the road works keep starting and stopping. There have been a number of near misses as cars try to do three-point turns before or after dropping children. Teachers now have to stand outside and manoeuvre bollards to make sure there is space for "blue badge holders" - putting themselves at risk of being injured. A request has been made to Highways Dept (Cambridgeshire County Council) for the lay-by to be designated "Blue Badge holders only" but so far the request has not received a positive response. The school therefore asks all parents/carers to park in one of the side roads and walk the last few hundred metres, leaving the lay-by for blue badge holders.

Horningsea Planning

Active Travel consultation - Cambs County Council

A consultation was launched by the Highways & Transport service at Cambridgeshire County Council regarding proposals for an 'Active Travel Hierarchy'.

The Active Travel Hierarchy looks to introduce a way of prioritising maintenance activities to better reflect the use of the highway network by walkers, cyclists and other non-motorised traffic. This will support the Council's Active Travel Strategy and its ambition to make walking or cycling the natural choice for shorter journeys, in turn helping to reduce road traffic congestion, improve journey times, and contributing to carbon reduction in the County.
